Penitential rite :

Officiant: As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Pope John XXIII's Encyclical Letter, Peace on Earth, and this 33rd anniversary of the martyrdom of Oscar Romero, let us understand that peace and justice always challenge us to become ever-more human, to be all that God intends us to be, to be advocates of human rights for all people. Let us now acknowledge our failure to be peacemakers, creators of justice, celebrants of equality :

Reader : The very order of things therefore, demands that during this sacred season we pray earnestly to Him who by His bitter passion and death washed away our sins, which are the fountainhead of discord, misery and inequality; to Him who shed His blood to reconcile the human race to the heavenly Father, and bestowed the gifts of peace. "For He is our peace, who has made both one . . . And coming, He preached peace to you that were afar off; and peace to them that were close." ('Peace on Earth', 169.)

Reader: Let us, then, pray with all fervour for this peace which our divine Redeemer came to bring us. May He banish from our souls whatever might endanger peace. May He illumine with His light the minds of rulers, so that, besides caring for the proper material welfare of their peoples, they may also guarantee them the fairest gift of peace. ('*Peace on Earth', 171*)

Reader : Finally, may Christ inflame the desires of all people to break through the barriers which divide them, to strengthen the bonds of mutual love, to learn to understand one another, and to pardon those who have done them wrong. Through His power and inspiration may all peoples welcome each other to their hearts as sisters and brothers, and may the peace they long for ever flower and ever reign among them. Reflections from The Violence of Love by Archbishop Oscar Romero


We have never preached violence, except the violence of love, which left Christ nailed to a cross, the violence that we must each do to ourselves to overcome our selfishness and such cruel inequalities among us. The violence we preach is not the violence of the sword, the violence of hatred. It is the violence of love, of solidarity, the violence that wills to beat weapons into sickles for work.

When we struggle for human rights, for freedom, for dignity, when we feel that it is a ministry of the Church to concern itself for those who are hungry, for those who have no schools, for those who are deprived, we are not departing from God's promise. He comes to free us from sin, and the Church knows that sin's consequences are all such injustices and abuses. The Church knows it is saving the world when it undertakes to speak also of such things.

For the Church, the many abuses of human life, liberty, and dignity are a heartfelt suffering. The Church, entrusted with the earth's glory, believes that in each person is the Creator's image and that everyone who tramples it offends God. As holy defender of God's rights and of his images, the Church must cry out. It takes as spittle in its face, as lashes on its back, as the cross in its passion, all that human beings suffer, even though they be unbelievers. They suffer as God's images. There is no dichotomy between humanity and God's image. Whoever tortures a human being, whoever abuses a human being, whoever outrages a human being abuses God's image, and the Church takes as its own that cross, that martyrdom.

Peace is not the product of terror or fear. Peace is not the silence of cemeteries. Peace is not the silent result of violent repression. Peace is the generous, tranquil contribution of all to the good of all. Peace is dynamism. Peace is generosity. It is a right and it is a duty.

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke (4: 16-21)

He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down. The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were fastened on him. He began by saying to them, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing."

For all people of faith, belief, and heartfelt conscience: that we may respond to situations of injustice, conflict, inequality, poverty and disease in the light of our belief, and so recognise the presence of the divine calling us to action for justice and radical compassion. For the Church, that its pastors, theologians, and pastoral ministers may always reflect God's call to a preferential option for the poor, remembering Pope Francis, now installed as Bishop of Rome, and Justin Welby, now enthroned as Archbishop of Canterbury. God, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer.**

For progress in the beatification cause of Archbishop Oscar Romero: that this heroic witness to the vision of the 2nd Vatican Council will, in this Year of Faith, continue to inspire a lively commitment to work for the unity of all people of faith, growth in personal belief and values, solidarity with the poor, and work for justice and peace. God, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer**


