




A Mass for the 40th Anniversary of the Martyrdom of Saint Oscar Romero


The Liturgy of the Word

A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews

(10: 32-36)

Remember all the sufferings that you had to meet after you received the light, in earlier days; sometimes by being yourselves publicly exposed to insults and violence, and sometimes as associates of others who were treated in the same way. For you not only shared in the sufferings of those who were in prison, but you happily accepted being stripped of your belongings, knowing that you owned something that was better and lasting. Be as confident now, then, since the reward is so great. You will need endurance to do God's will and gain what he has promised.

The Lord be with you. And with your spirit

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Glory to you, O Lord.

That very same day, two of them were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognizing him. He said to them, "What matters are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped short, their faces downcast. Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, "You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days." "What things?" he asked. "All about Jesus of Nazareth," they answered, "who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing." Then he said to them, "You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! 'Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?" 'Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself. When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. "It is nearly evening," they said, "and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. 'Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognized him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?" They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, "Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." Then they told their

story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognized him at the breaking of bread.

Homily

The Commissioning of the Guardians of the Shrine of St. Oscar Romero

Canon Richard Hearn : In accordance with the provisions of Canons 1230 and 1233, formally establishing the Shrine of St. Oscar Romero at the Cathedral Church of St. George, Southwark, and as its Rector and Dean, I ask you, Archbishop John, to commission the following persons, Mr. Julian Filochowski, Canon Alan McLean, Ms. Kathleen O'Brien, and Canon John O' Toole, as Guardians of this Shrine for the coming five years.

Archbishop John : Will you follow the example of Saint Oscar Romero in your care for this Shrine, enabling all who venerate his memory to be at one with the Church in pondering the Word of God and remaining faithful to the Breaking of the Bread?

Guardians : I will.

Archbishop John : In your care for this Shrine will you maintain not only a concern for its upkeep but also a commitment to promote the message of St. Oscar Romero who was a voice for the voiceless?

Guardians : I will.

(24: 13-35)

Archbishop John: May God who has begun this good work in you give you grace and strength to remain faithful to this task, and I therefore commission you as Guardians of this Diocesan Shrine of St. Oscar Romero for the coming five years.

Bidding Prayers

Archbishop John: As the Spirit of God brings the community of faith to life, each and every day, so may that same Spirit renew in us the historic memory of St. Oscar Romero, Bishop and Martyr, strengthening us to work for justice and solidarity, reconciliation, unity and peace, as we now pray:

For all who believe in Christ: that like Saint Oscar Romero we may be witnesses of the love and justice of God in the world and signs of unity. Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

For the poorest peoples and communities across the world: that the example of Saint Oscar Romero's faith-doing-justice might inspire a lively commitment to solidarity amongst all peoples, praying particularly for El Salvador, that violence may be overcome by harmony, poverty by prosperity, and war by peace. Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

For our global family: that as governments seek sustainable goals for aid and human development, so too may CAFOD, Christian Aid, and other agencies committed to be the voices of those who have no voice, be inspired by the words and deeds of Saint Oscar Romero. Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

For the work of the Archbishop Romero Trust, and the ministries and witness to the memory of Saint Oscar Romero in this Cathedral Church of St. George, in Westminster Abbey, Canterbury Cathedral, Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedral, St. Alban's Abbey, and many other places: that we may continue to be inspired by the lives and deaths of all our martyrs to build up the common good and a richer unity in faith. Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

For those who, today, have accepted responsibility as Guardians of the Shrine of St. Oscar Romero: that they may honour his memory in all they do and say. Lord, in your mercy – Hear our prayer. For all who have died, working for justice, peace, and unity: that they may inherit joy and peace, and all unknown victims of war and violence, also remembering Emeritus Archbishop Peter Smith. Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

For all who are gathered here: that we might imitate the values which drove Saint Oscar Romero in his journey of faith and search for justice, as we now pray in some moments of silence Lord, in your mercy - Hear our prayer.

And we unite our prayers with Mary, Mother of the Poor, as we say: Hail Mary

Loving God, you called your servant Saint Oscar Romero to be a voice for the voiceless poor, and to give his life as a seed of freedom and a sign of hope: Hear the prayers of your people and grant that, inspired by his sacrifice and the example of all the martyrs of El Salvador, we may without fear or favour witness to your Word who abides, your Word who is Life, even Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be praise and glory now and for ever. **Amen**

Who will act for our common home? Who will strive to save God's creation Who will speak so these needs will be heard? Who will speak if we don't? *refrain*


Prayer over the offerings


Mass Setting : English Chant
