

Ecumenical Service to Commemorate the 30th anniversary of the Martyrdom of Oscar Arnulfo Romero Archbishop of San Salvador

After a word of welcome from the Dean and Chapter of York Minster please stand as the procession begins.

Entrance Hymn

- Let us build a house where love can dwell and all can safely live,
 a place where saints and children tell how hearts learn to forgive.
 Built of hopes and dreams and visions; rock of faith and vault of grace; here the love of all shall end divisions:
 All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.
- Let us build a house where prophets speak, and words are strong and true, where all God's children dare to seek to dream God's reign anew.
 Here the cross shall stand as witness and as symbol of God's grace; here as one we claim the faith of Jesus: *All are welcome...*

- 4. Let us build a house where hands will reach beyond the wood and stone to heal and strengthen, serve and teach, and live the word they've known. Here the outcast and the stranger bear the image of love's face; let us bring an end to fear and danger: *All are welcome...*
- 5. Let us build a house where all are named, their songs and visions heard and loved and treasured, taught and claimed as words within the word. Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace; let this house proclaim from floor to rafter: *All are welcome...*

In the midst of hatred that divides people of different nations, ethnic groups, classes, religions and genders, **God forgive us.**

In the midst of our difficulty in accepting each other and in respecting our differences,

God forgive us.

In the midst of the covetous desires of the people and nations to possess what is not their own.

In the midst of the greediness which exploits the work of human hands and lays waste the earth,

God forgive us.

In the midst of our envy of the welfare and happiness of others,

God forgive us.

In the midst of our indifference to the plight of the imprisoned, the homeless, the refugees and the migrant workers, **God forgive us.**

In the midst of the lust that dishonours the bodies of men, women and children,

God forgive us.

In the midst of pride which leads us to trust in ourselves and not in God,

Homily Archbishop John Sentamu of York

<u>Litany of Commitment</u> led by Bishop Terence Drainey of Middlesbrough

God, our strength,

enliven our resolve to seek bread which nourishes and sustains, that through our resistance of instant satisfaction we may learn to value what we take for granted and seek solidarity with those who have nothing.

Hear us in your mercy, and strengthen us to do your will.

God, our judge,

guard us against all arrogance, hypocrisy and selfrighteousness, that through choosing the fast that undoes the fetters of injustice we may share our bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into our house.

Hear us in your mercy, and strengthen us to do your will.

God, our beginning and our end,

remind us that we are but dust and to dust we shall return, that through acknowledging our frailty and owning our mortality we may draw closer to those who live in the constant fear of death.

Hear us in your mercy, and strengthen us to do your will.

God, our challenger,

stir up our lives and shatter our complacency, that through the people we meet and the life stories we share we may be challenged to change and moved to action.

Hear us in your mercy, and strengthen us to do your will, and let our lives reflect your purpose. Amen. During the hymn a collection will be taken which will be divided between the Minster and the Archbishop Romero Trust to meet the costs of the day. Any monies remaining will be sent to the Ospitalito where Archbishop Romero lived, where he was killed and which still continues its work amongst the very poor suffering with cancer.

- 5. Lord, your summons echoes true when you but call my name Let me turn and follow you and never be the same. In your company I'll go where your love and footsteps show. Thus I'll move and live and grow in you and you in me.
